Craft Improvement

Precise taxonomic terms improve writer credibility

As outdoor writers, our stories often feature birds, fish, trees, wildflowers and other living things. When writing about these elements of the natural world, there is a tendency to group organisms into categories. References to categories such as "the hawk family" or the "bass family" appear frequently in outdoor publications.

The family is a legitimate taxonomic concept, routinely used in scientific nomenclature. Unfortunately, we outdoor communicators sometimes misuse the family classification, lumping living things into the wrong family or creating new families which don't exist in systematic taxonomy.

Consider these examples which appeared recently in widely read hunting and fishing publications. In an otherwise well written and informative story, one author referred to the "duck family," while another, writing about bobcats, cited the "lynx family."

Taxonomically speaking, there is no "duck family. Ducks belong to the family Anseridae, which includes all ducks, geese and swans. The bobcat belongs to the cat family (Felidae), also represented in North America by the lynx, mountain lion, jaguar and ocelot. By referring incorrectly to the "lynx family," the writer deprived all those other cats of a taxonomic "home."

There are no rules as to how many species can be included in a recognized taxonomic family. For instance, the turkey (Meleagrididae), beaver (Castoridae) and pronghorn (Antilocapridae) families hold but a single species each, while the minnow family (Cyprinidae) is represented by about 2,000 species worldwide, including our well known

carp, chubs, shiners and dace.

The family associations of some of our more familiar Pennsylvania wildlife are as follows: The white-tailed deer belongs to Cervidae, the deer family, also embracing mule deer, elk, moose and caribou. Taxonomists place the largemouth bass into Centrarchidae (the sunfish family) along with bluegills, crappies, and several dozen lesser known sunfish. The brook trout, our state fish, is a member of Salmonidae, which includes the true trout, char, salmon and whitefish.

It is easy to note a taxonomic family when it is referred to in Latin. All animal families end in the letters "idae," such as those noted above. Plant families consistently end in the letters "aceae." For example, the white oak belongs to the family Fagaceae, the "Beech family." This group includes all the oaks, chestnuts and beeches. Pinacae, then, is the family of plants holding pines, spruces, hemlocks and junipers.

Such details of taxonomy may seem trivial but we can improve and maintain our credibility as communicators by being precise in our writing about the scientific identity of the creatures we pursue and admire. Never has scientific precision been more important in our writing and speaking than it is today. Using accurate terms in our popular writing demonstrates that our interest, and the interest of our readers, goes beyond harvest and consumption of wildlife. Correct use of taxonomic classifications shows that we and our readers strive to understand wild things in their larger context, an important point in a society that sometimes questions the legitimacy of recreational hunting and fishing.

Complicating the quest for taxonomic precision in outdoor writing is the fact

This is a hard question to answer, but one we need to address.


But first, we have concerns far more urgent to address.

In case you missed the membership meeting, there is a big task ahead of us in rewriting the Duties Manual, Constitution and Bylaws. This work is necessary to make sure the organization is operating within its own guidelines and rules. The work is already underway with many members pitching in to help. I hope some of the issues can be resolved at the fall gathering and all of the work completed by next spring's conference. It is an aggressive goal, but it is one that I hope we can achieve.

Fortunately POWA has a strong backbone in its people, and many have stepped up to the plate to help. that scientists sometimes shift plants and animals from one family to another, establish new families or collapse ones that have been in use for centuries. The wild turkey, cited above, provides an example.

One school of thought among taxonomists strives to maintain the family Meleagrididae, of which the turkey is the sole member, while another advocates lumping the turkey into Phasanidae (the pheasant family) with pheasants, grouse and quail. Stay tuned for developing details is the best advice I can give.

In deference to those shifts, it is good practice to consult a recent reference when using the term family in our work. The Peterson Field Guide Series offers outdoor writers adequate and generally current taxonomic information on birds, mammals reptiles and amphibians, fish, ferns, trees and wildflowers. An excellent reference on fishes is "Common and Scientific Names of Fishes," published by the American Fisheries Society.

It is fine to refer to families, genera, orders and other taxonomic classifications in our articles, books and shows. But it is important that we get it right.









In Memoriam

Remembering Bill Feddock

Editor's Note: Longtime POWA member Bill Feddock died in an earlymorning fire on April 21. The following obituary ran in the Scranton Times-Tribune on April 24. Portions of a story detailing the fatal fire follow the obituary.

William S. Feddock, 89, of Forest City, died Thursday, April 21, in a fire at his home. His wife, Alice Ross Feddock, died in 1997.

Born Jan. 11, 1922, in Forest City, he was the son of the late William and Blanche Julius Feddock. He was a member of St. Agnes Church, Forest City, and worked as an industrial engineer for Procter & Gamble, Washington Twp., Wyoming County. Bill was a veteran of World War II and a member of the FC American Legion Post 524, where he was past captain. He was the chief prize-gatherer for the annual Rizner Children's Fishing Derby and a member of the Browndale Sportsman's Club. He was a past district deputy of the local Knights of Columbus and a charter member of the board of directors of the Rail-Trail Council.

His proudest achievements came as a writer for the Pennsylvania Outdoor Writers Association, where he achieved numerous awards and achievements. including the prestigious Student Mentor Award and the 1993 Best Newspaper Column Award. His "Tales 'n Scales" column appeared each week in the Forest City News for more than 25 years.

Every Saturday, accompanied by his daughter, Bill would attend a different church in the Diocese of Scranton. He was on a pilgrimage that amounted to more than 100 churches visited and always received a special blessing from the priest. Bill was a loving father and grandfather who had a tremendous love for God and the outdoors. He will be greatly missed by all who knew him.

Surviving are three daughters, Peggy Brager and husband, Frank, Forest City; Alice Morton, Arizona; and Patricia Konzman and companion, Ron Armstrong, Forest City; four grandchildren, Frank, Wes, Chris and David; three great-grandchildren, Kathy, Adam and Maggie-Jean; several nieces and

He was also preceded in death by a brother, Tom; and a sister, Mary Alice

Funeral was held in the Kevin M. Lesjack Funeral Home, 513 Main St., Forest City, followed by a Mass of Christian Burial in Sacred Heart Church, Forest City. Interment was in Sacred Heart Cemetery, Forest City.

An early-morning fire in Forest City, Susquehana County, on April 21 took the life of well-known newspaper columnist, 89-year-old Bill Feddock. Just as many were starting their day in Forest City a smoky and scary scene began to play out along the 700 block of Delaware Street.

Bill Feddock's home was on fire and firefighters said he wasn't alone in the house. Feddock's daughter, Patty, her boyfriend and son were also inside at time, and forced to think fast on how to escape the fast-moving flames.

"Patty actually went down to try to get her dad and her boyfriend and son had to jump out of the top window," said family friend Marie Rutsky.

The three eventually got out of the burning home but emergency crews said Feddock did not. His other daughter, Peggy Brager said her dad loved collecting antiques and writing about the outdoors.

"My dad was the most wonderful man anyone could ask for," Brager said. "He loved writing his weekly article. He wrote for the Forest City News. He wrote an article every week single for 25 years."

According to firefighters the blaze was so intense it spread to two neighboring homes. One of them was up for sale and empty. Two people lived in the other house and made it out safely.

I like to think I've helped guide POWA through the past eighteen months in workmanlike fashion without running our ship of state aground on the rocky coast of a fragile economy that has not been kind to our industry. Consequently, our organization continues to confront the specter of challenging times for writers who find too many markets for their writing – particularly newspapers and magazines – vanishing as the printed word increasingly goes digital and readers forego paper for Kindle and iPad. The economy has also had a devastating effect on our supporting members as evidenced by a precipitous decline in their numbers in just the past year alone. Our aging organization still needs to find more ways to recruit younger writers, photographers, videographers and others

to join our ranks. Or, as was suggested at last spring's conference in Wellsboro by at least one member, perhaps it's time we think about joining forces with other outdoor writing associations such as New York, Virginia, and Mason-Dixon to form a broader, regional organization (The Mid-Atlantic Outdoor Writers Association or MAOWA?). I'm not advocating that such a drastic move be seriously considered at this point in time - POWA has a long and storied history dating back over 60 years to its founding in 1950 under first president Seth L. Myers, and I doubt that any future sitting POWA president would be eager to preside over the association's perceived demise. However, desperate times often call for desperate measures, and if our numbers continue to dwindle at breakneck speed, some action may eventually be needed in the interest of self-preservation. I don't believe that time has yet arrived. Ideally, it never will, but realistically, we need to keep our options open.

Having said all that, I'd like to end on a much more upbeat note with a cheerful look forward to our Spring Conference. Harry Guyer has put together what promises to be an awesome event with plenty to do, see, and learn as he and Tim Flanigan showcase their beloved Bedford County. Admittedly, I'm looking forward to the moment when I hand the presidential gavel over to First Vice President Freddie McKnight and take my place as a POWA Past President. So for now, On to Bedford! I hope to see all of you there.

NEW BUSINESS

Duties Manual, Constitution – The Duties Manual is the blueprint of what our organization does. When we switched to one meeting from two, that affected the Duties Manual. When we stopped publishing six PowWows and dropped to four it had a major effect on the Duties Manual. Freddie and I spent two hours going over the manual to see what needs

updated, change by change, and what we need to do. What the board needs to decide is how many meetings a year there will be, how many the board is going to have, decide how many issues of PowWow to produce, have a look at the budget in a fiscal year and when it is going to run. That depends on how many board meetings you're going to have and how many issues of PowWow there are. And then there are elections. That has to be published in PowWow so members know what's going on. These issues have to be resolved. At this point I can't do it. I can offer suggestions. The board has to come up with how they're going to do it and how the membership is going to do it. When the membership is only together once per year it takes a long time to make any changes. It's not an overwhelming job but it's an important one that needs to be addressed. McKnight: Right now we have some major issues to deal with. The way we're doing elections is illegal. We should be having four board meetings, two face to face and two by phone. There should be six issues of powwow and we have four. We need to determine our fiscal year and budget. I'm ashamed because there were things I was to be doing as VP and wasn't. The VP is supposed to look at books and I wasn't. What we need to do is a two-year process at minimum. If we continue the way we are, we're working by the seat of our pants and that is illegal. Lollo: The Duties Manual requires us to do some things prior to an action, such as voting. That needs moved from fall to winter because election changes take place in May. The board needs to the determine fiscal year at same time. You must take action at least 30 days before start of new fiscal year. You need to coordinate everything that's been wrong now because we haven't been doing it correctly. McKnight: We have so many references to fall meetings and spring meetings and when things can be done: elections, meetings, PowWow all need to coordinate with each other so they all flow together. McKnight: I make the motion that POWA's Board of Directors, the chairmen of each POWA

committee and their board liaisons are going to revise the Duties Manual to reflect the current operating standards of the organization. Motion seconded by Tatum. After discussion, McKnight withdrew his motion and Tatum withdrew his second.

*Motion that POWA's Board of Directors, the chairmen of each POWA committee and their board liaisons are going to revise the Constitution & Bylaws and Duties Manual to reflect the current operating standards of the organization. McKnight/Feigert. Approved.

Raffles - Kermit Henning: Our major activity is the sports show and auction. Then we award grants to get kids in the outdoors. The auction did very well this year. We keep getting some bigger donations that we didn't in the past. Some are big-ticket items like Smith & Wesson giving us a revolver every year. Gerry Putt did two original paintings this year. We're finding that big items are what it takes and we find that guns bring big money. Keystone Sporting Arms offered us four of their popular Crickett .22 caliber rifles, plus hearing protection and goggles for \$350. They retail for \$149 and we would pay \$85 apiece. I'm sure this would be a big hit at the auction. What I'd like is your permission to buy the four guns and auction off two guns the next two years. I think it would be a wise investment. We raised over \$14,000 this year and gave out just over \$10,000 so we have the extra money to do it. Also, we handed out a coloring page at the show and we ran out. We're going to have more printed. Kids would come to our booth to pick up a copy. That gave us a chance to have people stop so we could talk and tell them about POWA.

*Motion to purchase the four Keystone Sporting Arms guns as Henning described, and he will propose how to best manage them leading up to and during the sportsman's auction. Sorensen/Cole. Approved.

New Membership Category—Lollo: We can't keep up with our yearly drop. Our supporting membership was 110, now we have 79. That's a big loss. Our active membership was 220 and now

we're at 172. Supporting members are staying with us for two years to get our email lists and address lists and then they go somewhere else. There is no continuity. I thought we should develop a new category of membership as a way to generate income. You'd just have to be living and breathing to be a member. I thought it would be worth it to have a discussion. Take the associate membership and drop the two-year requirement. Members who lose columns could join as an associate member or something like that. Feigert: We do have the apprentice program that all you have to do is declare an interest in being a writer or photographer and how you're going to accomplish that. It's a six-year commitment to fully qualify. Nale: I, for one, don't see why associate membership should be limited to two years. If I want to support POWA but don't have the points to be an active member, I should be an associate member. I think there's room for both. Feigert: We should maintain a certain level of exclusiveness. Sorensen: We don't want to dilute the value of membership. Bauer: I agree with what's been said. What are they going to get in return though? Will their names not be put in the directory? We have to be careful of adding legitimacy to it. Sorensen: To see how much interest there is, put out the word for next year's conference. Then have friends come or invite guests in order to gauge interest in a new category. If we don't succeed in inviting people, then we'll have an answer.


